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About this symposium

The symposium has been designed to enable a comprehensive examination of recent advances in the investigation and management of overactive bladder syndrome. The opening session provides current status overviews of the nomenclature and definitions of OAB, the epidemiology of the condition, its pathophysiology and the implications of the condition in terms of its economic impact. The second session provides detailed reviews of the current status of medical and nursing assessment in primary, secondary and tertiary care with the third session presenting comprehensive discussion of the current evidence and opinion base for clinical intervention in OAB, including behavioural, mechanical, medical and surgical approaches. The final session is devoted to an examination of what exactly constitutes good clinical governance of OAB services with a review of effective frameworks for continence services, the nature and requirements of government targets, currently available clinical practice guidelines, NICE judgements and practice audit. The symposium ends with a review of how all of our current knowledge, when successfully implemented in clinical practice, can result in measurable improvements in the quality of life of the patient.
